Keynote Presentation

Trauma-Integrating Somatic Leadership: The Intersection of Traumatology and Spiritual Direction in Times of Transition

The Rev. Dr. Shannon Michael Pater, Psy.D.

Transformational transitional ministry (our "what") is relational work across multiple generations of congregational/organizational life. The leader is simultaneously interacting with the immediacy of a community, the recent and long-term past that create relational patterns, and attempting to positively

influence the ever-emerging future and next leadership partnership. It's complex and requires skill-full support!

Hopefully, what happens in a successful interim period does not stay in the interim (our "why"). With a bit of luck, a lot of work, and surprises that only Spirit can provide, even after a significant relational disruption, the congregation can grow and integrate into a mutual, long-term relationship with their new leader.

"Trauma-Integrating Somatic Leadership" is a ministry model that merges relational insights of traumatology and spiritual direction into a scope of practice at the intersection of our "what" (relational work) and our "why" (relational transformation) during and after a transitional period. The flow of the Keynote will include a 90-minute presentation of the core concepts and 60-minutes of "applied theory." The Workshop following the Keynote is an opportunity for "questions, comments, clarifications, and rebuttals" and a few pre-submitted case consultations.

Diving Deeper in Trauma-Integrating Somatic Leadership in Practice

The Rev. Dr. Shannon Michael Pater, Psy.D.

Following Rev. Dr. Shannon Michael Pater's keynote, this interactive workshop will explore the practical application of Trauma-Integrating Somatic Leadership in transitional ministry. Bring your questions, insights, and experiences, and consider submitting a ministry case in advance for consultation and discussion. Together, we'll move from theory to practice, discovering new ways to foster healing, resilience, and transformation during times of change.



Shannon Michael Pater is a trauma-integrating somatic spiritual director whose work blends modern psychological insights with ancient wisdom traditions. Drawing on disciplines such as traumatology, Applied Polyvagal Theory, Applied Attachment Theory, and Internal Family Systems, Shannon offers a holistic approach to healing and spiritual growth.

At the heart of Shannon's practice is the belief that spiritual direction nurtures our connection to Inner Wisdom—whether by establishing, cultivating, or restoring it. This work emphasizes the importance of embodied (somatic) relationships with oneself, others, Spirit, and the natural world. With a trauma-informed perspective, Shannon creates a safe and courageous space for individuals to explore and heal the effects of trauma while moving toward greater wholeness.

Through an online platform, written work, and curated resources, Shannon supports others on their personal and spiritual journeys, inviting deeper awareness, integration, and transformation. Do You See What I See?

As leaders, we can be surprised when our intentions about what we say and do/don't have the impact we expected or hoped for. Using the model of the JoHari Window, along with skills associated with Emotional Intelligence, we will explore how to grow in our self-understanding through seeing ourselves through the eyes of others. A key skill for an effective, emotionally intelligent, transitional leader is assessing the impact of our behavior. How might we seek and integrate feedback, direct or otherwise, from others?



Rev. Dr. Jenny Stephens retired from the General Council of The United Church of Canada in May 2022, where she led the design and implementation of a denominational Office of Vocation as part of the broader denominational transition. Raised in the Methodist Church of Great Britain, Jenny has lived in Canada since 1982 (currently in Cambridge, Ontario) and worked within The United Church of Canada serving in both team and solo ministry in multi-point pastoral charges as well as 16 years as the Personnel Minister in Hamilton

More Than Filling a Position: What is Discernment?

Rev. Shuji Moriichi

In local congregations, discernment typically involves "town hall meetings" and "needs surveys" to reach the greatest happiness of the greatest number. Engaging in discernment as a spiritual exercise, on the other hand, we seek the gifts of greater spiritual maturity and intimacy with God in the process; practical decisions are the fruits of those gifts. Drawing on insights from Thomas Green's works on the Ignatian practice of discernment, the presenter will propose key perspectives and ideas to help the congregation engage in times of transition. With ample examples and stories that resonate widely, the presenter will explore with the audience practical questions such as What elements are necessary for fruitful communal discernment? What roles do individual members play? How to negotiate immediate and long-term goals while assessing the health of the corporate spiritual body? How to work with the Gatekeepers and the Bystanders in the congregation in the discernment period?



Rev. Shuji Moriichi, M.A., M.Div., BCC (APC) is the director of the pastoral care department, Mercy Medical Center, Cedar Rapids, IA, and ordained in the Mennonite Church USA. His ecumenical ministry experience includes clinical chaplaincy, interim pastorate, and research and writing for popular, church and academic periodicals.

Grief That Has No Funeral

Rev. Frank Walton

Congregational transitions often uncover grief that is real but rarely acknowledged. Churches may grieve for changes in leadership, identity, influence, traditions, relationships, or expectations, yet these losses frequently go unnamed because there has been no formal ending or public ritual of mourning. When grief remains unrecognized, it can shape resistance, anxiety, conflict, and leadership challenges within the congregation.

This interactive workshop explores how transitional leaders can recognize and respond to the emotional and spiritual realities beneath congregational behavior. Participants will reflect on the connection between grief and transition, examine practices that create space for listening and healing, and discuss how faithful leadership can help congregations move toward resilience, discernment, and renewed purpose during seasons of change.



Rev. Frank Walton is an intentional interim ministry leader, pastor, consultant, trainer, and organizational strategist with extensive experience guiding congregations and nonprofit organizations through seasons of transition, discernment, and renewal. His ministry and leadership background includes pastoral leadership, denominational service, church administration, media and broadcasting, nonprofit governance, and organizational development. He also serves as an authorized training consultant, helping faith communities strengthen leadership systems, operational effectiveness, and organizational clarity during times of change.

The work of intentional interim ministry has significantly shaped Rev. Walton's current focus on developing meaningful resources to support leaders and congregations during seasons of transition. He is currently developing the manuscript *God, Why Now? Becomingness In A Season of Transition* and has written Bible study and devotional resources, including *Known by God*, which highlights lesser-known individuals in scripture whose faithfulness, obedience, discernment, and quiet service helped shape God's greater story. These resources also encourage congregations to recognize and value the often-unseen individuals within today's ministries whose steady faithfulness continues to strengthen and sustain the life of the church.

The Emerging Effects of AI & Tech on the Church

Our society is in a huge time of transformation and upheaval, including with many companies sidelining human workers in favor of AI and technology. This workshop will explore the emerging effects of this movement on the church. How will AI and technology affect people inside the church in their ability to cooperate and respectfully disagree? Can AI be trained towards human relational skills? Will AI cause an erosion of trust and loss of hope? We will explore possible avenues leaders can take to encourage positive relational skills within the church and position themselves to be leaders in the community. We'll consider ways to build trust, vision, and hope. We'll touch on key skills leaders will need to have in

order to weather this transition and help their congregations coalesce around common goals and values.



Rev. Kimberly Secrist Ashby is an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) for more than 25 years, residing in Michigan with her two daughters. She is a teacher and facilitator in areas of emotional intelligence, conflict management, and mediation, and has both her Masters of Divinity and Masters of Education. She is passionate about community engagement and is currently engaged in leading her congregation in implementing the strategic plan they just built over the last few years. Holy Currencies is a holistic framework for faith communities to explore and assess their sustainability and missional capacity. A leader, in time of transition, can utilize this framework to guide a community to discern the truth of their internal and external community wellness; through maximizing and developing their relationship networks, they can connect and share and receive resources (time/place/money) from the neighborhood in missional ways resulting in becoming a more diverse and sustainable faith community. Participants in this workshop will gain an overview of this framework focusing on the gracious leadership skills needed to empower transitioning communities to discern truth and build relationships, setting the Cycle of Blessings in motion.

Participants of this workshop will have the opportunity to submit case studies – real faith-community-in-transition stories – to be analyzed with the Rev. Dr. Eric H. F. Law using the Holy Currency framework, hopefully resulting in deeper discernment of the issues and concrete suggestions on how to holistically approach and transform the concerns into opportunities for growth and wellness.



The Rev. Dr. Eric H. F. Law is the founder of the Kaleidoscope Institute (www.kscopeinstitute.org), which provides resources to equip leaders to create diverse and sustainable communities. He has been a consultant and trainer for over 30 years working with the Roman Catholic, Episcopal, United Methodist, Presbyterian, American Baptist, Unitarian Universalist, United Church of Christ and Lutheran Churches in the United States, Canada, Asia, Australia and Europe. 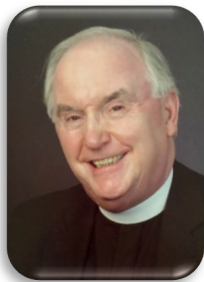

From Calling to Clarity: Keeping your Compass when Challenged by your Clock is a 75-minute workshop that explores how my practice as a transitional leader promotes health when grounded in the values and relationships found in my Compass while challenged by the events and things that float through my Clock. The workshop explores a balcony perspective method through evolving graphics and unfolding prayers that will help you deepen your understanding and integration of your own governing values / guiding principles. I demonstrate this method using the spiritual language of my life as priest of the Episcopal Church. You will engage a reflective practice that strengthens clarity, coherence, and confidence in your leadership. Spiritual Balance in Transitions: Core Practices to Resist Restlessness and Anxiety in the Congregational Community

Congregational transition is a time of crisis. There is hope and opportunity, but there are anxiety power shifts. Spiritual depth and leadership - or lack of it - presents pastors to offer spiritual formation and/or re-formation. Even in healthy situations, the pastors, spiritual balance, and health is tested. There are five essential practices that help the pastor, practice, spiritual presence and peace that also can contribute greatly to a congregation's health. This workshop will explore those five practices for the participant to implement in a specific setting.

Faithfulness in the In-Between

Rev. Frank Walton

Transitions in faith communities often uncover grief, uncertainty, competing expectations, and questions of identity beneath the visible work of leadership. Transitional leaders are called to do more than maintain systems; they are called to lead faithfully while helping congregations discern who God is calling them to become.

This interactive workshop explores how leaders can navigate the “in-between” seasons of ministry with discernment, resilience, and clarity. Participants will examine the difference between technical solutions and adaptive challenges, reflect on the emotional and spiritual realities beneath resistance, and explore practices that strengthen faithful leadership during uncertainty. Through discussion, reflection, and practical application, attendees will gain insights for leading with courage, humility, and purpose while helping congregations live more fully into their “why.”



Rev. Frank Walton is an intentional interim ministry leader, pastor, consultant, trainer, and organizational strategist with extensive experience guiding congregations and nonprofit organizations through seasons of transition, discernment, and renewal. His ministry and leadership background includes pastoral leadership, denominational service, church administration, media and broadcasting, nonprofit governance, and organizational development. He also serves as an authorized training consultant, helping faith communities strengthen leadership systems, operational effectiveness, and organizational clarity during times of change.

The work of intentional interim ministry has significantly shaped Rev. Walton's current focus on developing meaningful resources to support leaders and congregations during seasons of transition. He is currently developing the manuscript *God, Why Now? Becomingness In A Season of Transition* and has written Bible study and devotional resources, including *Known by God*, which highlights lesser-known individuals in scripture whose faithfulness, obedience, discernment, and quiet service helped shape God's greater story. These resources also encourage congregations to recognize and value the often-unseen individuals within today's ministries whose steady faithfulness continues to strengthen and sustain the life of the church.

Today's Virtual-only and Hybrid Ministry

During COVID, congregations and ministers were pushed into virtual ministry. Today, many congregations find themselves without the ministerial leadership they would prefer, yet are not comfortable choosing ministers who would serve largely virtually or with regular virtual/onsite plan. How can transitional ministers create virtual-only or hybrid ministry that feels relational and rich for congregants?

Patrice practices Tibetan Buddhist-based spirituality (20+years), has trained in teaching Shamata meditation, and studied Mindful Self-Compassion, and Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction (MBSR).

But effective intercultural leadership requires meeting people where they are, not where we hope they'll be. This workshop introduces the Intercultural Development Continuum as a practical framework for assessing your own intercultural capacity and designing meaningful interventions in faith communities. Participants will explore stage-specific strategies for supporting growth from helping those in polarization reconnect with shared humanity, to inviting those in minimization to discover how deeply our differences shape even our most universal values. Drawing on real-world examples from multifaith interim contexts, this session equips leaders with tools they can use immediately.



The Rev. Julie Boleyn is an ELCA pastor and the Executive Director of the Kaleidoscope Institute. A seasoned facilitator and nonprofit leader, she helps churches and organizations navigate cultural change, strengthen leadership, and cultivate communities grounded in justice and spiritual transformation. Pastor Boleyn comes to this work with experience in software development, fundraising, and community organizing.
